Finding God in the Desert Places

Dear friends,


As winter reluctantly loosens its grip on our New Jersey landscape, we find ourselves in that peculiar in-between season – where bare branches and remnants of snow exist alongside the first tentative crocuses and lengthening daylight. This tension between winter's last hold and spring's gradual emergence mirrors the spiritual journey of Lent. We stand in the "already but not yet," witnessing signs of new life while still walking through barren places.

This Lent, I invite you to journey with us through the wilderness. Our worship series "Wilderness Wanderings: Finding God in the Desert Places" explores how God meets us in our most challenging landscapes – those times when the familiar ground shifts beneath our feet and the path forward seems unclear.

Many of us are experiencing wilderness moments – navigating uncertainty, feeling spiritually parched, or searching for direction. Scripture reminds us that these desert places aren't just spaces of testing, but opportunities for profound encounter with God.

Each Sunday at 9:30 am, we'll walk with biblical companions who found God in their wilderness: Jesus facing temptation, Abram receiving covenant in darkness, the prodigal finding his way home, and Jesus entering Jerusalem with revolutionary humility.

The Easter Triduum: A Journey Worth Taking

"One day that just happens to have three sunsets and three sunrises."

When we hear the term "Easter Triduum" (pronounced "TRID-oo-um"), many of us might wonder what it means or why it matters. This ancient observance—the most sacred 72 hours in the Christian calendar—offers us a profound spiritual journey that transforms how we experience the resurrection.

What Is the Easter Triduum?

The word "triduum" simply means "three days" in Latin. The Easter Triduum begins at sundown on Maundy Thursday and continues until sundown on Easter Sunday. While chronologically spanning three days, these sacred hours function liturgically as one unified observance—one continuous worship experience unfolding through four distinct services, each revealing a different facet of Christ's paschal mystery.


Rather than treating these as optional add-ons to Easter Sunday, the early church understood that experiencing the full arc of this journey from table to cross to empty tomb—allows us to grasp the profound depth of Christ's sacrifice and the transformative power of resurrection.

Four Sacred Moments: A Complete Journey

At Bishop Janes UMC, we will observe this sacred time through four special services, each offering a unique perspective on Christ's final days:

Maundy Thursday: The Rite of Servant Love (April 17, 6:30 pm, Melick Hall) On this night, we'll gather around tables for a shared meal, experiencing the intimate fellowship Jesus had with his disciples.

Through foot washing and Holy Communion, we'll embody Christ's new commandment (mandatum, from which we get "Maundy") to "love one another as I have loved you." This service helps us understand that resurrection power begins with humble service.

Good Friday: The Rite of Sacrificial Love (April 18, 7:00 pm, Sanctuary) In partnership with our friends from Basking Ridge Presbyterian Church, the combined choirs will present "Not My Will but Yours" by Lloyd Larson, a moving musical reflection on Christ's passion.

Through Nine Universal Prayers for the world and a gradual extinguishing of lights, we'll experience how Christ's sacrificial love embraces all of creation. This solemn service creates space to contemplate the cost of our redemption.



Easter Sunrise: The Rite of New Beginnings (April 20, 6:30 am, Evergreen Cemetery by the mausoleum) As dawn breaks, we'll gather among the graves—not in despair, but in defiant hope—to proclaim that death does not have the final word. In this brief, meaningful service, we'll renew our baptismal covenant, claiming our participation in Christ's resurrection.

There's something uniquely powerful about proclaiming "Christ is risen!" as the sun itself rises over the horizon.

Easter Sunday: The Rite of Resurrection Life (April 20, 9:30 am, Sanctuary) Our journey culminates in a joyful celebration of resurrection with brass, bells, and voices raised in triumphant praise.

Through word, song, and Holy Communion, we'll launch our new sermon series "Made for More: Living the Resurrection Life." festive service reminds us that resurrection isn't just an historical event but a present reality that transforms how we live.

Why Experience the Whole Journey?

When we participate in all four services, something remarkable happens. Easter becomes more than a single Sunday celebration—it becomes a transformative journey that draws us into the very pattern of Christ's life, death, and resurrection.

Think of it this way: watching only the final scene of a great film might be satisfying, but experiencing the complete story—with all its tensions, conflicts, and resolutions—creates a much deeper impact. Similarly, entering fully into the Triduum allows us to experience the profound emotional and spiritual arc from Jesus's last meal with his disciples through the agony of crucifixion to the astounding joy of resurrection.

An Invitation to Share This Journey

This Easter season, I invite you not only to experience this sacred journey yourself but to share it with others. Who in your life might benefit from experiencing these sacred days? Consider inviting family members, neighbors, colleagues, or friends to join you for one or all of these special services. When we extend these invitations, we're not just asking people to attend a religious event—we're inviting them into a transformative story that has the power to change how they understand themselves and their place in God's world.

As you prepare to welcome guests, remember that your warm greeting might be the first step in someone's journey toward faith. A simple "I'm so glad you're here" can open the door to profound spiritual connections.

The Easter Triduum invites us to slow down, to enter fully into the mystery of Christ's passion and resurrection, and to be transformed by this journey from darkness to light. I hope you'll join us for this sacred pilgrimage—and bring someone along to share in its wonder.

For the month of April, we've moved our meeting on Monday, April 14, 2025 at 7:00 pm. in classroom 3/4 in the Dutcher Center.



Among the key projects is exterior restoration of our cherished stained glass window of Jesus the Shepherd facing North Finley, ensuring its brilliance is preserved for generations to come.

In addition, we are replacing the heavy folding tables and most of chairs throughout our space to provide fresh and comfortable furnishings for our congregation.

The choir room exit stairs will receive thorough wood repairs and a new coat of paint to ensure safety.

We also will be addressing other essential updates, including:

- installing a sump pump backup battery
- repairing aging faucets and urinal fixtures
- replacing the parsonage entry door

- refreshing the courtyard with new shrubs
- interior painting in many areas
- tackling miscellaneous repairs

Hearts2Hands Ministry is proud to support Knit The Rainbow

Year-round, the UWF Hearts2Hands Ministry provides handmade prayer shawls for persons in need of prayer and support during illness or difficult time.

But every fall they also craft, collect and send winter wear such as hats, scarves, cowls, mittens and socks to Knit The Rainbow in New York City which in turn will distribute them to homeless and at risk LGBTQ+ youth throughout the Metropolitan area. In December this year they sent 31 hats, 14 scarves, 4 cowls, and 2 pairs of mittens!

At least 40% of the homeless youth in New York City identify as LGBTQ+. Knit The Rainbow was founded in 2020 to empower and protect these youth by providing them with handmade knit and crochet winter clothing accessories. These items are made with love and placed right in the hands of those in need.

The Hearts2Hands Ministry invites anyone to join them when they meet on the fourth Tuesday of every month in the Youth Room from 7:00 to 9:00pm. Come to knit, crochet and pray. Tower Club Continues a 73 Year Streak of Tree Sales!


The Tower Club thanks you for all the support during the 2024 Christmas Tree sales campaign. It marked the 73rd year that Bishop Janes UM Church sold Christmas trees to raise money for missions and social concerns, along with creating good cheer and feelings in the center of Basking Ridge.

The Bishop Janes community invests hundreds of hours every year to pull off the Christmas tree sales, and the Tower Club can't do it without the beautiful BJUMC community.

For the 2024 season, we are blessed to give away \$39,000, and contribute \$4,000 to the church budget to offset some of the costs of using our fantastic facility. Missions & Social Concerns is tasked with identifying charities here and worldwide, that receive the funds, but some of the worthy organizations receiving these funds in past years include:

- Market Street Mission, providing comprehensive support including shelter, counseling, and job training for individuals struggling with homelessness and addiction
- Good News Home for Women, transforming women's lives through faith-based treatment and support for addiction, mental health, and trauma recovery
- C.A.M.P. YDP, a Hope Center in Paterson providing dynamic after-school and summer programs for children and families for over 60 years





- United Methodist Communities, offering compassionate care and services to seniors with a focus on independence and dignity
- God's Co-op Food Pantry, serving over 200 families in the Bernardsville, Basking Ridge, and Peapack-Gladstone areas
- UMCOR (United Methodist Committee on Relief), which has provided critical assistance to flood victims across the United States in 2024 while supporting migration, health, and sustainability programs
- Rice and Beans Ministry, bringing hope to children living in poverty in Costa Rica, Brazil, and the United States through small acts of kindness
